New Non-Game Permitting Requirements

Two (2) types of Permits

- 1. Non-Game Dealer Permit
 - Cost \$60 / \$240 By application only
 - Reporting Requirements
 - a. Maintain an updated log of possession (where did the animal come from) and an updated sales log (who did you sell to)
 - b. Annual reporting requirements
 - May Collect, Breed, Sale native non-game wildlife on the "White List"
 - May sale to anyone...

2. Non-Game Permit

- Cost \$18 Point of Sale (Wal-Mart, etc.)
- Reporting Requirements
 - Maintain an updated log of possession (where did the animal come from) and an updated sales log (who did you sell to, along with permit number of Non-Game Dealers)
 - b. No annual reporting requirements
- May Collect and Breed native non-game wildlife on the "White List"... but may only sale animals to NON-GAME DEALERS!

3. No Permit is needed, provided:

- Person possesses 6 or fewer of one species on the "Black" List
- Person possesses 25 or fewer of one species on the "White" List
- NO commercial activity NO sale/ barter / trade / etc.

Two (2) types of Lists

1. "White" List

- These species may be collected, bred, and sold as long as the valid permit is in place.
- ONLY THE SUBSPECIES THAT ARE NATIVE TO TEXAS ARE AFFECTED!! (See Milksnake)

* Side note – It is YOUR responsibility to know what is native to Texas... unfortunately the chances are Law Enforcement WILL NOT! Protect yourself, but don't screw the rest of us!!

2. "Black" List

- These species may be collected and even bred, as long as:
 - a. No more than 6 of one species are in possession at any one time,
 - b. NO commercial activity NO sale/ barter / trade / etc.
- ONLY THE SUBSPECIES THAT ARE NATIVE TO TEXAS ARE AFFECTED!! (See Common Gartersnake)
- * Side note It is YOUR responsibility to know what is native to Texas... unfortunately the chances are Law Enforcement WILL NOT! Protect yourself, but don't screw the rest of us!!

The species names being used are based upon the Society for the Study of Amphibians and Reptiles (SSAR) listing Scientific and Standard English Names of Amphibians and Reptiles of North America North of Mexico.
